

CHAIRS REPORT. 2nd quarter TT07.

Cristal has been getting all fiscal on us!

I am pleased to say that it has been another promising quarter for OUSGG, with general profits rising at 4.1% above inflation.

The OUSGG outside scheme has been the major focus of this term and despite some initial set backs, the main influences being the poor weather and the bugs in the University Parks, participation in these events has been above 90% of current turnaround. This has come from several lucrative cash cows such as the punting which is a regular in Trinity Term, but also a couple of rising stars, the main one being kayaking with the Isis Canoe Club. Unfortunately due to the unexpected growth in this area there was insufficient resources in place to meet the demand and several customers were not able to receive this product. However with the market knowledge that we now hold it is thought that this can be overcome in future. The other major success in the outside scheme was at the start of this financial quarter with the Sports Day. This longevity of this product may unfortunately be tarnished by the actions of one of the major components, we will have to look at replacing the 'Nick' who broke an egg and crashed into a 'Luke', before we continue this line.



There has still been some focus on OUSGG inside, even though this has taken more of a back seat as most resources have been put into OUSGG outside. The Oxford Dive centre produced a new product for OUSGG inside that could steadily increase its market share over the coming financial year, namely Scuba Diving. Turnout for this event was just above 50% but with the positive feedback that has been given by customers, and with a more active marketing campaign I believe that this could grow in the future. There does not seem to be much room for the growth of the F&GPC that despite a good turnout, in a spectacular venue was still boring.

My special thanks go out to the OUSGG Annual Dinner Management Committee, who despite judicious main course planning, made a simple error in their later course choices by not opting for profiteroles. This action has unfortunately meant that one of the committee has been laid off. The event was further tarnished by the actions later in the evening of certain individuals, yet with some careful marketing and a general shift in the focus of the company I feel that the damage to this brand name can be minimised.

As always, my sincere thanks to all members of OUSGG who have helped make this quarter a success. I look forward to taking this company further with you in the future.




